

Single-year grant requests for a minimum of \$2,500 to a maximum of \$25,000 are considered for projects that work towards advancing the mission and goals of the Susquehanna Riverlands Partnership, outlined in the Susquehanna Riverlands Strategic Plan: (1) habitat and trail (re)connectivity, (2) sustainable public access to the Susquehanna River and its surrounding natural lands, (3) emphasizing community partnership and collaboration, and (4) ecosystem health. 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Examples of How the Two Programs May be Paired



Example 1: Trailhead access improvements and rain garden

Scope of work: Nonprofit ABC proposes to expand their existing parking lot/welcome center at a popular trail along the Susquehanna in Lancaster County by adding 15 spaces to an existing 20 car lot, including 2 new ADA spaces. To address additional impervious cover, the nonprofit is adding a rain garden with interpretive signage for visitors to learn about the importance of clean water and native plants. The parking lot and rain garden have already gone through the preliminary design, engineering, and permitting process.

Budget summary: Nonprofit ABC estimates that the project will cost \$40,000, with costs summarized below. They will apply to the SRCL Mini-Grant program for \$20,000, the Clean Water Fund for \$17,000, and they will provide an in-kind match of \$3,000 worth of staff time.

Example 2: Expanded environmental education programming to showcase local watersheds

Scope of work: An educational foundation (a 501C3) associated with a Lancaster County school district is planning to expand their environmental education programming to help students better understand how their actions affect water quality and other aspects of the ecosystem, conservation careers to consider, and local recreational opportunities. Activities planned include experiential learning for students about their local watershed, helping to plant a riparian buffer at a restoration site and also native landscaping on their school's campus, discovering local organizations and projects that have been done to improve water quality, visiting best management practices to see how they function, and even getting out on kayaks in the Conestoga and Susquehanna Rivers. The teachers have already been working with an instructional coach to align the planned program with the new PA Science Standards; more work is needed to finalize lesson plans and coordinate logistics.
